Territory as Economic Engine ERAs 2.0

Over the past two years, a group of six ERAs has shown the capacity to transform themselves from recipients of external assistance to providers of assistance for their neighbor communities.

Our goal is to transform these ERAs into "ERAs 2.0" through diverse investments from the public, private, and philanthropic sectors. ERAs 2.0 will commercialize marketable products at scale and provide sustainable livelihoods to tens of thousands of Colombians living in the communities most affected by conflict.






Fonseca


Women led communitarian system to produce free-range eggs

The Rural Alternative School of Fonseca is located near the Serranía del Perijá, and aims to scale up a community-based system of free-range egg production. Scaling up means reaching 8,000 hens and producing 1,400,000 eggs per year. One hundred families would benefit from these healthier eggs, saving 25% on cost. This project is led by women and will continue to grow with a gender approach prioritizing women as new partners in the scaling process.

San José del Guaviare

Local Materials Recycled for Agricultural Resources

The ERA of San José del Guaviare is located in a region that was affected by conflict, but has diverse agricultural potential and access to larger markets.

The ERA has proven to be a capable producer of fertilizer and animal feed, using locally-grown products and processes developed in partnership with PASO Colombia. Scaling these activities has the potential to reduce the costs of agricultural inputs by 30% across the region, benefitting thousands of people including Socorro and her family.

Carmen del Darién

Ancestral medicine laboratory in the pacific rainforests

The Rural Alternative School of Carmen del Darién is establishing a natural medicine laboratory building on the traditional knowledge of the afro-colombian and indigenous communities of this territory on the Colombian pacific coast. This project aims to improve medicinal plants cultivation practices, training women in the transformation of medicinal plants, marketing them under the "Verde Jigua" brand, and strengthening the local use of traditional community health kits. This 400 families in the Jiguamiandó river basin will be impacted and will help to protect this area as a natural reserve.

For 2 year, in association with ex-combatant groups,. the project will focus on recovery of their botanical traditional knowledge, the development of medicina/personal care products, and the support of their home gardens.

Saravena

A corridor of prosperity along the Colombian-Venezuelan border

The Saravena ERA is a socioeconomic inclusion platform to benefit Venezuelan migrants, victims of the armed conflict, and ex-combatants along the Colombian-Venezuelan border. Currently, 116 parents & 500 children benefit. Scaling to a 2.0 ERA will expand coverage to 348 parents with a solidarity income, 1,500 children and establish 15 community orchards.

This "Brotherhood ERA" improves the economic income and food security of vulnerable populations. Participants develop community gardens, short-cycle agricultural projects, and farmer markets. Community dining rooms will provide food for the nutritional recovery of Venezuelan migrants or returned children. Also, binational ties will be strengthened through cultural, gastronomic and productive exchange.

Tuluá

Reconciliation through specialty coffee entrepreneurship

In the Tuluá ERA, former combatants and victims of the armed conflict have consolidated a comprehensive coffee production, transformation and commercialization network in this mountainous area of Valle del Cauca. Scaling to a 2.0 ERA means offering a special coffee through the improvement of its quality, increasing the coffee growers' income, and integrating more families. This expansion will allow a 63 tons coffee production per year, the commercialization of its own brand "Café Venus", and a 15% higher purchase price for coffee growers.

Currently, the high quality coffee produced is an example of reconciliation among families that were part of the armed conflict.

Mutatá

Boosting Fish Production & Organic Animal Feed in Jose del Leon/Becuarando


The Mutatá ERA is a platform that integrates multiple services and productive units for families in the San José del León and Becuarandó areas. Ex-combatants have developed a fish farming project, supported by the European Union. The ERA of Mutatá 2.0 would boost fish production to 96 tons, and guarantee commercialization among local buyers by completing the required cold chain. Additionally,this project will include organic animal feed production in Becuarandó, offering savings of 30% in fish production.

The ERA in Mutatá is made up of two hamlets created by ex-combatants displaced by paramilitary threats. Currently, participants work under the AVIVE and Paramillo brands to support the development of different productive projects.





